

A Season of Trust and Hope

PASTORAL TRANSITION



Some seasons in the life of a church feel like turning a page. Familiar words give way to blank space, and the story continues not with certainty, but with trust. This is one of those seasons at Covenant.

Last fall, our congregation marked the closing of a meaningful chapter as Senior Pastor Thomas Daniel accepted a call to Highland Park Presbyterian Church in Dallas. In late September, Covenant gathered to offer prayers of gratitude for Thomas and Beth Daniel, celebrating years of faithful leadership and the many ways God's presence was known through their ministry. It was a moment of joy tempered with tenderness, a reminder that endings and beginnings often arrive hand in hand.

Since then, Covenant has been living into a quieter, steadier work. Under the leadership of Interim Head of Staff Jill Williams, the church has continued its life together worshiping, serving, learning, and caring for one another while attending to the deeper questions that naturally surface in a season of transition: Who are we now? What is God shaping among us? Where might we be called next?

Rather than rushing toward answers, Covenant has chosen to listen.

Earlier this year, members were invited to share their voices through a church wide survey. Those responses are now being woven into a Mission Study, a reflective snapshot of Covenant's life, values, and sense of calling in this moment. The Mission Study will help articulate not only who we are as a community, but what kind of leadership will best serve the church in the years ahead.

Prayer has been central throughout this season. In January, Covenant held a 24 hour prayer vigil, with members praying around the clock for the person God is preparing to become the church's next senior pastor. Prayers were also offered for patience, wisdom, and trust, for leaders carrying responsibility, and for the congregation as a whole. It was a quiet but powerful act of faith, grounding the search in hope rather than urgency.

As spring arrives, Covenant is preparing to take its next faithful step by forming a Pastor Nominating Committee. This group, elected from within the congregation, will carry the sacred work of listening deeply, discerning prayerfully, and conducting a confidential search for the pastor who will one day be called to serve here. There is no fixed timeline for this process. Instead, the pace is guided by discernment, trust, and openness to God's leading.

Through it all, Covenant's ministry continues. The life of the church has not paused while the search unfolds. Worship fills the sanctuary, relationships deepen, service extends into the community, and the mission remains clear: to encourage one another to follow Jesus wherever we live, work, and play.

This season is not merely about finding a new pastor. It is about becoming a people who wait well, listen carefully, and move forward together with confidence that God is already present in what is unfolding. The story is still being written, and Covenant steps into the next chapter with gratitude for what has been and hope for what is yet to come.

Celebrating 65 Years








Come celebrate with us!

A Place to Gather

The Covenant Churchwide Picnic at the Skaggs'

When Jan Skaggs is asked what first comes to mind when she thinks about the Churchwide picnic each May, she doesn't hesitate.

"Baptism," she says. "It's the baptism."

Not just the moment itself, but everything around it: the congregation gathered along the creek banks and dam, people standing shoulder to shoulder, cheering when the pastor and the baptized emerge from the water. It is celebratory and communal and deeply joyful. "It's one of the best gifts to us," Jan says.

That scene captures what the picnic has come to represent over decades: not simply an event on the calendar, but a living picture of the church as a whole. On Sunday mornings, worshipers are often divided by service times. At the picnic, those lines dissolve. "If you're an 8:15 worshiper, you don't really get to know the 11:00 people," Jan explains. "Out here, everybody mixes and mingles. The baptism becomes this picture of the whole body of Christ."

Held on the Skaggs' property for roughly forty years, with a brief hiatus along the way, the picnic has grown into one of Covenant's most beloved traditions. Jan and Harold have been married for 32 years, but the picnic predates their marriage, reaching back to the late 1980s. Its return, they recall, was fueled in part by the youth group. Kids loved coming out to the property, and as the students came, the parents followed. Soon, the whole church followed too.


On picnic day, the valley fills with blankets, food, and people spread across the land. Cars now park safely in the pasture, thanks to a carefully orchestrated system of cones and volunteers, and by dusk those same cones are magically gathered up as everyone pitches in to help. It is casual, cooperative, and quietly organized, the kind of order that emerges when a community knows the place and one another well.

For Jan, opening their home and land has never felt like an obligation. "It's a real privilege and honor," she says. "I'm just really grateful that God has provided this place and that we can provide it for other people." Growing up in cities, she notes, many children rarely experience open land like this. "It's like a gift we received from the Lord that we're happy to pass on."

Harold sees the land itself as part of that gift. Over the years, they've found Indigenous artifacts on the property dating back thousands of years, reminders that this place has been lived on, loved, and gathered in long before them. "This spot on earth that God made has been occupied and loved on by generations and centuries of people before us," he says. "We're so fortunate and so blessed to get to live here."

That sense of stewardship shapes everything they do. From Men in the Word barbecues to choir and Lamplighter parties to the picnic itself, sharing the land is simply part of being faithful with what they've been given. "We're nothing but stewards," Harold says. "We're trying to be good ones."





Over time, even the preparation has become communal. What once fell mostly to Harold now involves a whole crew, led by Jack Skaggs, who has turned workdays into something joyful. People mow, haul, and prep together, sometimes with supervised older kids climbing onto tractors and equipment. "It's a joy to let kids who are so controlled in town do something a little different," Jan says.

And then there are the details everyone remembers: the rope swing that launches brave swimmers six feet into the creek, always tested first by "some giant brave boy"; the familiar foods brought year after year; the women who know their way around the Skaggs' kitchen; Harold wandering from table to table sampling potato salad, chicken salad, and watermelon like a very happy dog. "We know who makes the best of everything," he laughs.

At its heart, the picnic feels like what church can be at its best. Harold calls it "an Acts 2 moment", not because anyone is studying scripture, but because people are breaking bread, sharing space, and caring for one another. Different ages, different services, different personalities, all together. "Everybody gets along," Jan says. "Everybody helps."

It also feels safe. The Skaggs often compare it to a family reunion, complete with crabby uncles and overly helpful great-aunts. For years, their own family gathered here, and visiting parents remarked on how free their children felt, able to run and explore without fear. That same sense of safety now extends to the wider church. "It's a safe place," Jan says. "It's a family."

When the day winds down and people head home, Jan and Harold hope they leave lighter than when they arrived. With joy. With a sense of community. With a deeper awareness of God's

presence among them. "The Lord is what brought us together," Harold says.

They felt the absence of that gathering deeply during COVID, when the picnic couldn't happen. Even in dry years, the community adapted, once turning a hillside into a giant slip-and-slide when the creek ran low. The point was never the conditions, but the togetherness.

As the years go on, Harold has begun quietly ensuring the picnic will outlast him, passing leadership to the next generation, hoping it continues to bring joy long after he and Jan are no longer the hosts. "It means so much to this community," he says. "I'd love for it to keep going."

For now, though, each May, the valley fills again. Food is shared. Children swing into the creek. Baptisms are celebrated with cheers echoing off the banks. And for one long, beautiful afternoon, the church becomes fully visible, gathered in joy, grace, and gratitude.

Baptism at Covenant

Baptism is a visible sign of an invisible grace. The visible sign is the water. We use water because water purifies, it refreshes, and it cleanses. The sign points towards the promise that in Jesus Christ we are engrafted into the family of God, that we have received forgiveness of sins, and that one day we will be resurrected to eternal life.

The sacrament of baptism has deep and wide ranging theological meaning in the Christian faith. Here at Covenant we believe that the depth and beauty of the gospel is on full display when our congregation observes and participates in a baptism. As Presbyterians, we believe that baptism is both a gift we receive and a means by which we participate in God's story and live lives of discipleship.

Baptism is first a gift because it is something we freely receive on account of God's mercy. We do not enter into the waters of baptism because we have earned God's love. Baptism is grace. Prior to anything we have ever done, God speaks words of love and belonging over each one of us. When we baptize children at Covenant, we lean into the promises of God that he claims and loves each one of us even before we can respond.

We also believe that baptism is a primary way we respond in faithfulness to God.



We encourage and celebrate when people in our congregation make decisions to be baptized because baptism provides an opportunity to make a public profession of faith to renounce sin and to follow Jesus. Responding to God's grace and participating in the story of God is the greatest calling we have upon our lives. To that end, we invite children who were baptized as infants to participate in a confirmation class. In confirmation, we invite our youth to remember their baptisms and God's grace in their lives and to stand in front of the congregation on their own two feet and proclaim "I believe." Praise be to God for his grace that goes before us and for the opportunity to respond.

Covenant Builds

Building Home, Building Community at Community First! Village

For nearly a decade, Covenant has been showing up at Community First! Village with hammers in hand and hearts wide open. What began as a small effort by a dedicated group has grown into a long-standing partnership, one that has helped provide safe, dignified housing for neighbors coming out of chronic homelessness.

This spring, Covenant is building its sixth home at Community First! Village.

Our first build took place in 2016, when a small team from Men in the Word assembled a simple kit home, fitting together pieces much like Lincoln Logs. In 2020, during the height of the pandemic, that same core team built two identical homes at the same time, offering stability and hope in a season marked by uncertainty. The fourth home followed in 2022, and the fifth in 2023, each one deepening relationships, strengthening skills, and reinforcing Covenant's long-term commitment to this community.

Over time, Community First! Village itself has grown into a more expansive and structured organization. Volunteers now arrive on site wearing hard hats and high-visibility vests, and homes are built from standardized plans provided by the Village. The home being built this year is part of a new phase of development that includes hundreds of homes, each intentionally designed to foster connection, dignity, and belonging.

What makes this year's build especially meaningful is that, for the first time, the entire Covenant community has been invited to participate.



The response has been remarkable. More than 60 people have already signed up to volunteer, and the January build dates filled quickly. What was once a small, specialized project has become a shared expression of service, generosity, and faithfulness.

Community First! Village is a ministry of Mobile Loaves and Fishes, a Christian social outreach organization founded in 1998 and supported entirely by private and corporate donations. The Village is a master-planned community providing affordable, permanent housing and supportive community for men and women coming out of chronic homelessness.

Every detail of the Village is intentionally designed to encourage relationship. Homes feature front porches and are clustered around shared spaces, including laundry rooms, restrooms and showers, outdoor kitchens, and green spaces, creating natural opportunities for connection. Today, nearly 470 formerly homeless neighbors call the Village home. Once fully developed, it will serve approximately 1,900 residents, with access to a market, clinic, counseling services, and meaningful job opportunities.

Each home Covenant builds represents more than a structure. It is a place of safety, dignity, and belonging, and a visible sign of what can happen when a community shows up together.


